

Each of the following passages from Exercise #4 exhibits some problem in the handling of primary text quotations. Your task here is first to identify the problem and second to revise the passage to eliminate that problem. Use the back if you need extra space; alternatively, there is a Word copy on the website.

1. She declares that "My great miseries in this world have been Heathcliff's miseries" (24).

2. She knows this is wrong "In whichever place the soul lives—in my soul and my soul and in my heart I am convinced I'm wrong." (62)

3. "My love for Linton is like the foliage". She speaks of a covering (protection) that serves a purpose and has no future beyond that purpose. "My love for Heathcliff is like the rock" (foundation). It is necessary for my being. "I am Heathcliff".

4. [Convert to an integrated quotation] Yet in almost the same instant she says, "It would degrade me to marry Heathcliff now."

5. Catherine also goes on to say that Heathcliff is her reason for being when she states, "if all else remained, and he were annihilated, the Universe turn to a mighty stranger" (24).

6. Later she states, that her *great miseries* have also been Heathcliff's since they first encountered, and her love for him is said to resemble *the eternal rocks beneath*.

7. Catherine's bond with Heathcliff cements the idea that her internal divide overtakes her: " 'don't talk of our separation again—it is impracticable' " (Bronte 88). Catherine's separation from her other self, her wild Heathcliff, inevitably leads to her end.
